# PATTY DEAN TO SPEAK ON CASS GILBERT IN MONTANA ON FEBRUARY 28, 2006


Patty Dean, formerly on the staff of the Minnesota Historical Society, and now a resident of Helena, Montana, where she grew up, will present "Unique and Handsome": Cass Gilbert's Designs for the Montana Club on Tuesday, February 28, 2006, at the University Club, 420 Summit Avenue, Saint Paul, at 7:00 P.M. Ms. Dean was a participant in the recent Cass Gilbert Society tour to Montana. Dinner and a presentation at the Montana Club were among the tour's highlights. She will give us further information about Cass Gilbert's work for the Montana Club and place it into the context of his other Montana designs.

Gilbert with his partner James Knox Taylor began to work in Montana early in his career. Geoffrey Blodgett vividly depicts Gilbert's journey to Helena to meet with Albert J. Seligman: "Despite the westward momentum of the iron horse, getting across Montana to its capital could still be a frontier adventure. In March 1887 Cass headed for Helena by train toward the end of the hardest winter in anyone's memory. Ice chunks in the flooded Missouri River blocked the tracks near Bismarck, North Dakota.

Cass and his fellow passengers crossed the river by boat to climb into a cluster of old stagecoaches on the other side. . . . Suddenly the driver lost control of his charging team. The coach spilled over, and Cass and the driver were thrown into the fresh snow. . . Cass got up unhurt and ran to help the other passengers. . . . Survivors caught the next train west, and Cass met his appointments in Helena two days later. Territorial newspapers carried the dramatic tale." (Cass Gilbert: The Early Years, p. 78)

We anticipate that we will be joined by members of the Minnesota Chapter of the Society of Architectural Historians (MNSAH), who are planning their own tour to Montana in July.

Admission is free to Society members. There is a nominal charge for nonmembers. Refreshments will be served after the lecture. Support for Cass Gilbert Society lectures is provided in part by the Minnesota Humanities Commission.



prepare a schematic design study for the restoration, but unless bonding funding is authorized, actual restoration work will not go forward. HGA has worked on many notable public buildings in Minnesota, while SCA has undertaken the restoration of several state capitols, including Ohio, Kansas, and Utah.

Several Cass Gilbert buildings in New York have been in the news. The Austin, Nichols and Company Warehouse was designated a New York City landmark on September 20, 2005. Such designations are subject to review by the New York City Council. In the face of strong owner opposition and active lobbying against the designation by the local council member, the City Council denied the designation by a vote of 43-6 with one abstention on November 20, 2005. Then Mayor Michael Bloomberg vetoed the City Council action stating that the members of the landmarks commission "are the experts charged with determining what buildings are worthy of landmarks designation." Nonetheless, the City Council overrode the mayor's veto.

On Friday, January 20, 2006, New York Times reporter David Dunlap authored a story on public access, or lack thereof, to various designated interior landmarks in lower Manhattan, including two Cass Gilbert-designed buildings. He could barely get in the door of the Woolworth Building, but he was able to visit the U.S. Custom House, now the home of the National Museum of the American Indian, after passing through a metal detector.

The plaque to honor Cass Gilbert was to be placed in the Woolworth Building in 1931. ## MINNESOTA STATE CAPITOL BUILDING

As citizens of Minnesota involved in our state's civic life, we value the State Capitol as a historic public building and as the symbolic heart of our state. The people of Minnesota want our legislature to take care of our state's Capitol.

Minnesota's State Capitol is one of our state's treasures, but it is threatened. Water is leaking through the roof, destroying paint, plaster, and who knows what else behind its walls. There are fire and safety issues to which attention must be given. Our Capitol is 100 years old this year, and while we celebrate its Centennial, it's appropriate to examine whether or not we are caring for this great building in a way that will ensure that it is in good shape for our grandchildren and their children in 100 years to come.

#### **Resolution**

WHEREAS the Minnesota State Capitol Building celebrated its centennial birthday on January 2, 2005; and

WHEREAS the Minnesota State Capitol Building, at the time of its groundbreaking in 1898 and completion in 1905, marked and established a new trend in the civic architecture of our country's state capitol buildings; and

WHEREAS the Minnesota State Capitol Building has been found to be in great need of a comprehensive, holistic, and thorough restoration effort, as detailed in the legislatively mandated 2001 Pre-design Study for the State Capitol Building.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we urge the Governor and the Legislature to respond favorably and with strong commitment to the full restoration of the Minnesota State Capitol Building, and

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED that we support the Governor and the Legislature in including the full request for \$26 million for renovations of Phase I, the East Wing, as submitted by the Capitol Area Architectural and Planning Board for the 2006 Capital Budget.
